Instructional Procedures

- 1. Have students complete the journal prompt in their journals.
- Using the ability to demonstrate self-management, students will develop an opinion paper about what makes up a family. In expressing both their opinion and research

- found on the topic, students will present their own emotions and thoughts on the topic.
- 3. Introduce the topic of writing an opinion paper. Ask the students, what is an opinion?
- 4. Introduce the overall topic of this opinion piece: What makes up a family?
- 5. Lead students in a discussion about the different types of families. How do you define *family*? What makes a family strong? Do family members all need to be related to be considered a family?
- 6. Direct students to develop an opinion statement about what they believe makes up a family.
- 7. Review the Opinion Paper Student Checklist with the students in order to clarify the expectations for this assignment.
- 8. Pass out the Opinion Paper Graphic Organizer. Have students write their own opinion statement in the appropriate space.
- 9. Review the remainder of the Opinion Paper Graphic Organizer.
- 10. Direct students to give three reasons that support their opinions. These reasons should demonstrate the logical conclusions that led to their opinions.
- 11. Computers may be used to find evidence to back up their reason. At least one of the three reasons must have evidence that has been researched.
- 12. If time allows, review the document How to Cite Research from a Website.
- 13. In their paper, students must provide a concluding statement related to the opinion presented.
- 14. Students will complete this assignment during Days 8, 9, and 10.

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
